LEADERSHIP MESSAGE

Welcome to our 2012 Annual Report! As you will see we've had another engaging year with programs, education and development. Nothing would be possible without the dedication and efforts of our wonderful staff and volunteers and it is a great pleasure to work with them.

On October 1, 2012 we welcomed a new Chair, Robert Wortzman. Many thanks Robert for taking on this rewarding challenge; I look forward to benefiting from your guidance. Thanks to our outgoing Chair, Ian MacNair, for his years of contribution to the Board of Directors and the support he has shown Variety Village. During the year we welcomed to the Board Al Tinney, Alan Harman, Laura Young, Gillian Bone and Rob Kunihiro - five individuals who have already made significant contributions to our progress.

This year's financial results are very promising. Not only has Variety achieved a positive consolidated net operating income for the year, we have finally sold our surplus property. Consequently, we've created a financial reserve that will allow us to repay substantially all of our long term debt over the course of time. These results reflect the combined efforts of our management and staff being ever-mindful of our responsibility to ensure we are handling funds entrusted to us in a prudent and sensible manner, while still delivering on our promised mission.

The promising financial results do not reflect in a substantial way the progress being made on implementing elements of our strategic plan discussed in last year's report. By year-end we were in final discussions to arrange support from the Province of Ontario to assist us in designing the first-ever certificate program in adapted physical education, a program being developed in partnership with the University of Toronto. Our Rehabilitation to Community program is taking shape through consultation with most major rehabilitation hospitals in the Toronto area. And work continues in creating expanded recreational opportunities for children and youth with disabilities.

With much sadness, we note the passing of our Vice Chair, Chris Chenoweth. Chris was an invaluable source of advice to management and was a strong,

steadying force on the Board of Directors. We will miss him.
Also, long-time Tent 28 member Sam Sniderman passed away.
His larger-than-life personality harkened back to the glory days of Variety
Club and the dedicated members who had the vision and determination to
create the amazing facility at Variety Village.

Thanks to the staff, volunteers and other supporters who make the wonderful work we do possible. And thank you for your ongoing interest in Variety Village - a truly special place.

VARIETY IN ONTARIO

Variety Club was formed in Ontario by a group of men in show business to mirror the good work of those who founded the first Club in Pennsylvania.

That Club originated as a gentlemen's social club, but soon found a higher mission as a result of a mother's abandonment of her baby girl in one of the men's theatres. They decided to spend less time socializing and more time helping less fortunate children and their families.

In 1948, Variety Village was founded and shortly became recognized internationally as a vocational training school for boys with disabilities. Variety Village continued to meet the needs and interests of people with disabilities well into the 70s - when the school was closed. As children were assimilated into the regular school curriculum, Variety continued to provide physical education through integrated programs in sport, training, fitness and life skills with the opening of the fieldhouse in 1981 and the aquatics wing in 1989.

Today, Variety continues to support individuals, schools, community groups and organizations in areas of inclusive practices, access and awareness.

A COMMON INTEREST

Variety has a talented, dedicated staff who provide expertise in programming, education, finance, sales, marketing and fundraising.

Variety's employees daily demonstrate outstanding initiative and enthusiasm. They approach their work with conviction and passion. To illustrate this point, consider the extraordinary project initiated by our staff during the Summer Camps of 2012.

Camp Coordinator Ben Scholes had a vision. Under his lead, and with the involvement of our tireless camp staff, Justin Bunt, a talented film student and Variety Village employee, filmed a documentary about the lives of the very special children who attend Variety's Summer Camps.





YEAR 1 OF 5 · STRATEGIC PLAN

2012 marked the beginning of major growth and expansion set to take place over the next five years implementing the four pillars of our strategic plan. The plan is based around the four primary areas of focus of Variety Village: Sport and Recreation, Health, Education and Facility Redevelopment.

THE 4 PILLARS

SPORT AND RECREATION: THE CENTRE FOR INCLUSIVE SPORT DEVELOPMENT

Our goal is to increase the participation rate in regular physical activity for youth with a disability from the current 3% to 6% by 2016. One outcome of this should increase the number of elite athletes who compete in the Paralympics and the Special Olympics.

HEALTH: REHABILITATION TO COMMUNITY

The major contributor to a recurrence of a critical health incident such as a stroke or a heart attack is lack of regular physical activity. In partnership with health service delivery organizations, our goal is to engage over 1,000 participants in a post-rehabilitation exercise program to reduce their chances of a readmission and to improve their quality of life.

EDUCATION: INCREASING AWARENESS THROUGH OUTREACH

Under the Province of Ontario Accessibility for Ontarians with a Disability Act, every business is required to comply with a range of customer service and accessibility standards by 2025. Variety Village is meeting all standards and has the knowledge to assist in this process.

FACILITY REDEVELOPMENT: MEETING THE NEEDS

Over the years Variety Village has evolved to meet the changing needs of society. Our last major expansion was in 1989. We will create the partnerships necessary to redevelop our site for the 21st Century. These will include more opportunities in education for our children, youth and young adults to increase awareness and enhance quality of life.

WALK ROLL RUN & FUN FALL FAIR

For six years CTV's Tom Brown has hosted the annual Walk Roll Run & Fun Fall Fair event. In 2012 this community-based, 5 km walk, roll, and run through the neighbourhood surrounding Variety Village attracted more than 500 participants - 60% were repeaters.

Open to people of all ages and abilities, the Walk Roll Run event leads to increased awareness of our programs and services within the community. An event that requires participating in some level of physical activity, either through walking, running or rolling in wheelchairs, walkers, hand-bikes, etc., is in keeping with Variety's mandate of supporting healthy living and healthy lifestyles.

















WORLD'S GREATEST CHRISTMAS PARTY

This signature annual fundraising event for the whole family raised \$40,000 dollars. Over 1,000 people enjoy tasty treats and a special visit from Santa and Mrs. Claus. Craft and vendor's markets, face painting, arts and crafts, entertainment, games and activities round out the event. The party is an affordable way for families to celebrate the holiday spirit in a safe, welcoming and inclusive environment, while helping Variety Village raise funds for its specialized programs to support people with disabilities. The second annual Squared Circle Live is an action-packed, hard-hitting and family-friendly wrestling company that stage wrestling shows at Variety Village and donates 100% of the proceeds to support our programs and services. Funds raised at this annual tournament for 150 golfers have almost reached the cumulative million dollar mark! The Ontario Teamsters have been committed to helping kids with disabilities at Variety Village for almost 30 years by providing funding for many of our children's programs.







MISSION BASED EVENTS

For over 30 years Variety Village has been the chosen venue to host the annual Toronto Police Service Children's Games and the Lieutenant Governor Games.

The Police Games highlight 200 children with disabilities playing alongside 200 police volunteers and EMS staff in a day of fun-filled activities and games. For many children the Games provide opportunities to participate that they may not have in their communities.









GRASSROOTS FUNDRAISING

Grassroots events don't raise hundreds of thousands of dollars but they do allow our program staff to purchase equipment and supplies to offset the cost of running various programs.

Proceeds from barbeques in the parking lot have purchased gymnasium mats, tools to repair our wheelchairs and basketballs for our sport and fitness programs. Our LINKS adult day program held a rousing bowl-a-thon and the funds enabled participants, their families and staff (43 people in total) to go to Niagara Falls for a three day respite experience. The group enjoyed a dinner at the Skylon Tower and went to a number of attractions including the Butterfly Conservatory, IMAX, Bird Kingdom, Maid of the Mist and Heartland Forest.

The second annual Zumbathon helped Valeria, one of our amazing fitness instructors, purchase fitness equipment to improve the performance of our members. Some of the equipment included BOSU Balls, Medicine Balls, Kettle Bells and Undulation Ropes.







LONDON 2012

Canada was represented by 145 athletes competing in 15 sports at the 2012 Paralympics. Our Canadian athletes trained hard to get to the podium and were rewarded by bringing home seven gold, 15 silver and nine bronze medals.

Over the years, the Canadian Men's National Wheelchair Basketball Team has developed into a world leader and highly recognizable force in the sport thanks to numerous international successes that include three gold medals in the past four Paralympic Games (2000, 2004, and 2012) and a silver medal in 2008.

ADDING IT UP

All of the hard work that the Variety Village community does to raise money and awareness for their favourite charity really paid off in 2012.

We experienced a 41% increase in the number of people who supported us in 2012, resulting in a 17% increase in donations over 2011. We focused on getting the word out about the community impact of our valuable programs available for funding, and the community response has been encouraging.

From individual connections, to corporate relations, every aspect of community building was evident in 2012 fundraising. A newly established Major Gifts campaign is certainly a highlight for the year, along with committed annual donors who stepped up to give generously as often as they can.

Why do we need donor dollars?

Donated dollars allow us to continue to provide services to our vulnerable community through programming and facilities. We receive revenue from fitness club memberships which helps to defray our operating costs, and the Provincial government provides financial support. Nevertheless, our needs consistently outweigh the funds provided, and donors play a critical role in bridging this gap. We rely on our partners - individuals, corporations, government and foundations who share our vision for inclusiveness and who realize that including and supporting people with disabilities and their families isn't just the right thing to do; it's the smart thing to do.

Our Community Impact

Based on a conservative valuation, every dollar invested in Variety Village creates over \$7 of value to the community and the economy. We think that's a sound investment. Thanks to our supporters, Variety Village provides over two million hours of programming each year, reaching over 30,000 individuals, with more than 15,000 of these individuals having a disclosed disability.



FINANCIAL RESULTS

The consolidated financial results for the year are summarized from the audited financial statements of Variety - The Children's Charity (Ontario) and Variety Village (the 'Organization').

The Organization achieved \$5.5 million of revenue (excluding non-recurring provincial grant of \$1.0 million) representing an increase of 11% compared to the prior year.

Expenses for the Organization remained relatively flat year over year resulting in an improvement of 23% to the deficiency of revenue over expenses before non-recurring items.

REPORT OF MANAGEMENT

Management is responsible for the preparation of the financial statements and other financial information in this report.

This responsibility includes maintaining the integrity and objectivity of the financial records. The organization maintains policies and procedures for a system of internal controls designed to provide assurance that its records include the transactions of its operations.

The Board of Directors, through its Audit Committee, is responsible for determining that management fulfills its responsibilities in the preparation of the financial statements, and ensures the financial and operational controls of the Organization are adequate.


